

HEDGEROWS

Hedgerows provide food and shelter for wildlife, as well as acting as wildlife corridors.
Lots of species benefit from hedgerows:



Hedgehogs can forage for food and nest at the base of the hedges.



Bats use hedgerows to help them navigate, and they hunt for food (such as moths) along hedgerows.



Reptiles and amphibians use hedgerows as corridors to move between habitats, hide from predators, and look for food.



Squirrels can eat the acorns from oak trees and the nuts from the hazel trees.



Birds can nest in hedgerows and eat berries from the trees.



Pollinators such as butterflies, bees, wasps and moths eat the nectar from the flowers.

Many other species of invertebrates, fungi, birds, and mammals also benefit from hedgerows.
