Overview

Habitats & Heritage is seeking a Conservation & Interpretation Officer for our National Lottery Heritage Fund project, *Burton: Exploring Without Boundaries*, which centres around the Grade II* mausoleum of nineteenth-century explorer Sir Richard Francis Burton and Lady Isabel Burton. This is an exciting and varied role which will help to secure the future of an historic building, overseeing the conservation of the mausoleum, re-instating the door, and improving the interpretation, accessibility and sustainability of the site.

The role will include working with the local authority, stakeholders, contractors and volunteers to carry out conservation works, training and research. You will work with the local community and organisations, delivering talks and events to increase the number of people engaging with and participating in local heritage. The post holder will be inventive and enthusiastic about heritage, producing accessible information for diverse audiences to raise awareness of Sir Richard Burton



and the mausoleum. You will recruit, manage, and oversee volunteers who will contribute to a research and maintenance programme.

Burton: Exploring Without Boundaries additionally delivers an educational programme focused on the life of Sir Richard Burton, exploration during the British Empire and the impact that this may have had on different communities. The Conservation & Interpretation Officer will be expected to liaise closely with the Outreach & Education Officer.

The project will centre around southwest London but may require travel to other parts of the UK for research and engagement.

This is a unique opportunity to help with the conservation of a listed structure and to better present the life of Sir Richard and Lady Isabel Burton.

Key Responsibilities and Tasks

- 1. Oversee the conservation of the Grade II* listed Burton Mausoleum
- 2. Work with stakeholders such as Historic England, local authorities and local communities to achieve better heritage presentation and local benefit
- 3. Lead a research programme into the mausoleum and its context
- 4. Develop and produce material related to project, for on-site and digital interpretation
- 5. Recruit, train and manage volunteers
- 6. Complete monitoring report forms, volunteer records and other administrative tasks
- 7. Organise and oversee events and engagement opportunities, such as Open House London
- 8. Develop local knowledge of the historic environment, civic societies and community groups
- 9. Contribute to ongoing fundraising, through trusts, foundations, events and donations
- 10. Work closely with the Outreach & Education Officer and Burton Project Manager to deliver NLHF project plan
- 11. Work closely with the Church to improve accessibility and sustainability of the site
- 12. Undertake training where appropriate
- 13. Establish and train a friends group to oversee continuing maintenance of the site

The role requires an individual with experience in conservation, project managing and good interpersonal skills.

The role will require occasionally working during evenings or weekends.

The role will require regular travel to the mausoleum in Mortlake, the Habitats & Heritage office in Twickenham and other venues.
